MEETINGS

IMPAR Monthly Report Launch Meeting was held

10 November 2021 IMPAR released its 19th Monthly Progress Report for October-November 2021. The meeting was Chaired by Mr Khalid Ansari, Executive Director IMPAR and Mr Syed Rizwan, Advisor, Media and Communication launched the report by briefing about the contents and important interventions that were present in the Monthly Report.

EVENTS

Changing Political Dynamics and Role of Police in Social Peace and Justice

On 15 November 2021, an online program was conducted on Changing Political Dynamics and Role of Police in Social Peace and Justice where following points were discussed by the speakers:



Mr Khalid Ansari: Began the proceeding by welcoming all the speakers and other members who joined the meeting. He then introduced Dr Kashmir Singh as a well-known IPS officer, retired as Additional Director CISF. Mr Khalid Ansari said that Considering Dr Kashmir Singh's achievements and rich experiences, the immediate question that emerges is that crimes are one of those things which have been ever present in our society and to tackle that the intervention of police is sought. But in recent years, we have noticed that the criminality of offences is heavily tainted with political overtones which interferes with dealing with crime in a judicious manner. Police personnel are now often required to bring to task criminals with political backgrounds and the police in such cases are susceptible to unwanted political pressures. As a result, those who took the oath to abide by the service rules must, I guess, forsake their primary task which is quite unfortunate. Mr Khalid Ansari questioned Dr Kashmir Singh that had he ever faced such a situation and how did he reconcile to it?

Dr Kashmir Singh: According to the National Commission's third report, 60 percent of all arrests are unnecessary. What kind of reform is possible? The first change might be to take away arrest powers from non-police groups because they are increasingly being utilized on a large scale to cause harassment in society. If this isn't done, then deprive them as cops and make them follow the CRPC. The real issue begins


during the lodging of an FIR; once a FIR is filed, fake content is created, which should be a questionable issue. Jails are filled with under trial people and more than 80% people are either under investigation or not convicted. The Supreme Court of India laid down guidelines in the famous case of Mr DK Basu that was Right to life and right to know. A lot of adjustments are required in the police department. Retired DGP Mr Prakash Singh filed a case in the Supreme Court in 1996, seeking many reforms in modernizing the police. This case took ten years, and in 2006, the Supreme Court issued very clear directions, some of which were for police functional autonomy and accountability, but to our surprise, not even 10% of the recommendations are being followed by any state. We all know how things are now: the government is managed by retired people, such as the Director. CBI is a retired person, and Secretary RAW is a retired person, thus this commitment from retired people is causing us issues, and the scenario is shifting. The question of how to combat this is a serious issue, and my simple approach is to educate our people about their rights. To deal with the riots it is important to take into confidence the minority community; they only want justice to be served. He went on to say that a group of advocates should be formed, citizens should be made aware of their rights, the system's flaws should be documented, people should be educated about the process and their rights, and accurate information should be disseminated. As a society, we must be aware of the shifting conditions.

Mr Noor Mohammad: Thought that something was missing and discussed the reality on the ground. He claimed that Dr. Kashmir Singh was indeed a distinguished police officer, but we all know that the police are not always fair, that politicians use the police, and that societal cohesion has been disrupted. The question now is: what should we do? He added that we must discover what action we can undertake so that we may make a difference on the ground through the brainstorming activities that IMPAR is attempting to do. He stated that the best path ahead is to identify and eliminate flaws. The reason why police are behaving the way they are is because they are under pressure, and there is no liability or accountability. Because power corrupts everyone, so it will be misused if there is no accountability. We need to build a civil society. He also proposed that we raise donations and secure the release of the prisoners. If there are any truly innocent persons, we can assemble a team of legal professionals from various districts and states to examine the situation and determine how the prisoners might be helped. We can also build a communication system such that when anything is misreported, an instant Fact Check must be conducted and shared throughout the world. He also emphasised the need of identifying the right representative without regard to political affiliation. He went on to say that as a society, we should begin to consider how to truly develop a positive relationship with police officers, at least with the good ones. He also advised that a committee called the "Peoples Commission for Social Harmony" be formed to find and disseminate accurate information.

Prof Khwaja Shahid: Cited Dr Kashmir Singh's statement that if the top level is corrupted or acts indifferently in a certain situation, the condition will be worsened. Only by changing negative narratives from the top to the bottom can the political landscape and the role of police be transformed.

Brigadier Ahmad Ali: In his closing remarks, reflected on where the fault lies. He thanked all the speakers for their valuable insights, as well as IMPAR for putting this informative session on shifting political dynamics and the role of police in Social Peace and Justice"

Documentation Drive

As a part of IMPAR's Documentation Program, IMPAR District Council Bijnor held an EAP (Elector Awareness Program) on November 27, 2021, at Najibabad, Uttar Pradesh, under the supervision of Mr Asif Muttaqui, IMPAR District Coordinator.

A Documentation Program was initiated by IMPAR for the need to overcome the lower participation of the community members in social and political activities, as a result of which District Council Bijnor has registered a number of new applicants on the Indian electoral roll and distributed a number of requisite forms to people. Aside from new registrations, the team is also dealing with entry corrections, address changes, and voter ID card preparations.

They do care while in winters poor people sleep in cold on roadsides providing them with woolen blankets. 


A NOTE OF APPRECIATION

Remembering Allama Iqbal



09 November 2021, On this day, Sir Muhammad Iqbal was born in Sialkot, Punjab in 1877. His family was originally Kashmiri-Brahmans who had converted to Islam in the 15th Century. After completing a Master of Arts in 1899, he joined Government College, Lahore as a junior professor and soon after became Reader in the Arabic Department of Oriental College, Lahore. Then in 1905, he left for England to pursue higher studies. At Trinity College of Cambridge, he gained a second Bachelor of Arts degree in English Literature and then went to Germany where he did a Ph.D. in Philosophy at the University of Munich.

In India, Muhammad Iqbal is known for writing the Tarana-e-Hindi- Saare jahan se achcha Hindustan hamara, but world-over he is acclaimed for his works on politics, economics, history, philosophy, and religion. Compilation of his philosophical thoughts titled under, Asrar-e-khudi that got translated into English earned him the knighthood of the British Crown. During his stay in Europe, he had started writing in Persian and continued to do so throughout his life. He returned to Lahore in 1906 and re-joined the Government College as professor of philosophy and English Literature.

Iqbal, who earned the honorific Allama, was a writer, philosopher, politician whose poetry in the Urdu language is reckoned as one of the greatest among the 20th-century writers. In 1899, when he was doing M.A, Iqbal wrote the classic Parinday ki Faryad that serves as a guide for the youth. Later on, when his son, Javed, was studying in England he wrote a letter to him that was guidance in poetry. The opening stanza of this nazm goes like this:

Dayar-e-ishq mein apna maqaam paida kar, naya zamana naye subah-o-sham paida kar. Khuda agar dil-o-fitrat shanas de tujhko, Sakoot-e-lala o gul se kalaam paida kar.

Allam Iqbal was an ardent proponent of the political and spirited revival of Islamic revival. The six lectures that he delivered at Madras, Allahabad, and Aligarh on the role of Islam as a political and legal philosophy have been collected together under The Reconstruction of Religious Thought in Islam. Iqbal's poetry has been translated in many languages and his poetry in Persian is very popular in Iran to this day. According to Annemarie Schimmel, Iqbal was a son of Kashmiri-Brahmans acquainted with the wisdom of Rumi and Tabrez.


On return from Germany, Allama Iqbal had started practicing law in the Chief Court in Lahore, but soon quit to devote himself to literary works. He was now getting a pension from the Nawab of Bhopal which served as his means of livelihood. He was quite influenced by the writings of the western philosophers, Nietzsche, Goethe, and Bergson. His political inclinations led him to active politics. He had joined the All India Muslim League as Joint Secretary and got elected to Punjab Legislative Council in 1929. Then he joined the Khilafat Movement and joined hands with the Congress Party in the freedom movement led by Mahatma Gandhi.

Iqbal was also one of the founding fathers of Jamia Millia Islamia and was referred to as the Hakeem ul Ummah (The Sage of the Ummah). He died in April 1938 and was buried in Hazuri Bagh, Lahore.

IMPAR pays homage to the genius of this great thinker-poet on his 144th birthday with the closing couplet of his epic nazm, Shikwa-Jawab-e-shikwa:

Ki Muhammad se wafa tu ne toh hum tere hain Ye jahan cheez kya hai loh'o qalam tere hain. And then Hazaron saal nargis apni benuri pe roti hai Badi mushkil se hota hai chaman mein dida-o-var paida





Birth Anniversary of Pt. Jawaharlal Nehru


14 November 2021, On the birth anniversary of Pt. Jawaharlal Nehru, IMPAR wishes children across the world a Happy Children's Day!

Children also admired Jawaharlal Nehru and referred to him as 'Chacha Nehru.



Essay on International Day for Tolerance

16 November 2021, Topic: Intolerance- A potential threat to Nation's integrity



Understanding the importance of tolerance:

Tolerance is a character trait that values equality in society despite the presence of differences. It respects people for their capacity to live and let others live, regardless of their religion, caste, viewpoint, practices, or customs. Tolerance is also a capacity that allows individuals to attain or give justice by listening to and understanding the varied points of view. Acceptance of differences- tolerance can resolve many problems and is a necessary attribute in any functioning democratic nation.

On the other hand, Intolerance is the inability to admit the views, actions, or customs of different castes, religions, or cultures. It has the potential to increase the degree of divisiveness, hate, crime, and prejudices in society. Intolerance prevents people from enjoying social rights such as equality, indiscrimination, and freedom. Intolerance in society is usually caused by caste, culture, gender, religion, or any other unpalatable behaviour and it poses a severe threat to the Nation's integrity.

The atmosphere of intolerance in India and its antidote:

India has been the finest example for the term "Unity in Diversity." This concept of unity in diversity can be further explained as a unity without uniformity and diversity without disintegration. In contemporary India, diversity, which has been a cultural and moral asset, is unfortunately under attack. Religious intolerance and the caste system are the two main categories of intolerances, causing a schism.

Religious animosities are deep-rooted. This rising intolerance has put our country's peaceful existence in jeopardy. Majoritarian groups have become intolerant of minorities, and vice versa. Surprisingly, religion, which was intended to understand life and reality has become a subject of conflict despite living in the modern era. What are we leading towards is a serious question that must be discussed. Hate crimes committed in the name of faith and religious supremacy give the notion that we are still living in the dark ages. But it's important to remember that intolerance displayed by proponents of religion does not always reflect the religion itself. Intolerance is hard to scale since it differs from person to person. Religious intolerance should not be encouraged to weaken the country's cultural identity. We need to reconsider this quote "Religion is like a pair of shoes, find one that fits you, but don't force others to wear those shoes".

Another form of intolerance common in India is caste prejudice. The caste system is a centuries-old social divide associated with political, socioeconomic, cultural, and regional issues. This is accompanied by intolerance for what others may do, consume, or touch; how they live, dress, or do anything else for that matter. While what has historically been considered upper-caste traditions are the ones to strive towards. Those at the bottom of the caste ladder are the ones who are looked down on. As a result, labels for what is "good" and "bad" have been established. People are born into a caste and tend to keep many aspects of their social lives within it, including who they marry. Whether Hindus, Muslims, Christians, Sikhs, Buddhists, or Jain, Indians today nearly universally identify with a caste.

Throughout history, humanity has struggled with these problems. There is a wicked tendency in us as humans that has the potential to warp and distort our moral views. And in the mission to counter this, there are a few antidotes that can help us towards developing tolerance:

"The highest result of education is tolerance". Greater emphasis needs to be placed on educating the common masses and especially the students should be taught to appreciate and understand diverse cultures, viewpoints, and ingrain in them the sense of tolerance at school.

Intimate inter-group interaction can improve each other's personal experiences while reducing intolerance.

To encourage tolerance and knowledge of cultural sensitivity, the media should use positive pictures. Promoting press freedom and pluralism, which allows the people to distinguish between facts and ideas, is the most effective strategy to reduce the power of hatemongers.

"If you are irritated by every rub, how will you be polished?". Individually, we must be tolerant of differences and willing to accept our shortcomings for a change.

Governments should be held accountable for implementing human rights laws, prohibiting, and prosecuting hate crimes and discrimination.

We must not wait for governments and organisations to respond alone. We're all part of the solution and responsible for any change in the system.

In an atmosphere where unrest and uneasiness have become more relatable terms, practising tolerance will prove constructive. As a country, we must assess our declining morals and ethics. Otherwise, our country will be plagued with plenty of issues.

A reminder at the end: "Don't get so tolerant that you tolerate intolerance".

Humble Tribute to 'Punjab Kesari' Lala Lajpat Rai on his Death Anniversary



17 November 2021, Lala Lajpat Rai was born on 28th January 1865 in the Ludhiana district of erstwhile Punjab Province. He played a pivotal role in India's freedom movement and came to be popularly known as Punjab Kesari. In 1880, Lajpat Rai joined Government College at Lahore to study law, where he came into contact with Lala Hansraj and Pandit Guru Dutt who later turned out to be freedom fighters.

By the time Lala Lajpat Rai completed his law degree, his father had been transferred to Hisar. So, Lajpat Rai joined the Bar Council of Hisar of which he was a founding member. At the same time, he was a regular contributor to many newspapers including The Tribune. He also helped Lala Hansraj in establishing the nationalistic Dayanand Anglo-Vedic School in Lahore.

In 1914, he quit law practice to devote himself to the freedom movement. He travelled to Britain and America in 1917 where he formed the Indian Home Rule League of America in New York. On return to India, he joined Indian National Congress and took an active part in political agitation in Punjab for which he was arrested and deported to Mandalay. But there were not sufficient grounds for subversion and was, thus, released. Then in 1920, he was elected the President of the Indian National Congress in the Calcutta Special Session.

In 1928, the British Government had set up the Simon Commission under Sir John Simon to report on the political situation in India. Lala Lajpat Rai was among the leading political figures who opposed the working of the commission and gave the slogan, 'Simon Go Back'. On 30 January 1928, when members of the Simon Commission visited Lahore, Lala Lajpat Rai led a protest against it. The Superintendent of Police, James A Scott, ordered the police force to lathi-charge the protestors. Lajpat Rain was severely injured in this assault, but even then he got up to address the crowd, "I declare that the blows struck at me today will be the last nails in the coffin of British rule in India'.

Lala Lajpat Rai succumbed to his injuries on 17th November 1928.




Guru Nanak Jayanti





This day is observed to create awareness of the Indian Constitution. As a result, we at IMPAR are striving to educate people about the important ideals that the constitution upholds.






Mahaparinirvan Diwas

Decades on, the great leader is remembered for his vision to make India a better place to live.




Armed Forces Flag Day
